A survey of nguraren (*nah-ren*), western ringtail possum.

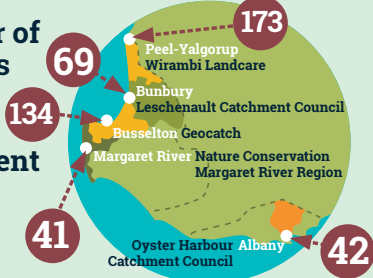
A snapshot of results **April-May**

## Number of ringtails seen in each catchment



**3** sites were observed with young



3 of 5 sites had ringtails!

**42**

possum sightings of which **21** were identified as different individuals



a total of **725** minutes were spent looking out for possums, across **30** evening surveys



Majority of ringtails seen on Marri tree



**24** Residents expressed interest in survey



**8** residents took part in the survey

average number seen during a survey



**1.4**

of **6** reported deaths (seen this year) **100%** were due to road kills.

The nguraren (*nah-ren*) was declared critically endangered in 2017.

## Conservation: How can we help?



To protect our ringtails, keep cats and dogs inside at night at a minimum, protect your peppermint, marri and jarrah trees, plant native gardens and drive carefully at night.
